Clean teeth and examine oral areas, head, and neck for signs of oral disease. May educate patients on oral hygiene, take and develop x-rays, or apply fluoride or sealants.

Independence – Allow employees to work on their own and make decisions.

- Finger Dexterity
- Arm-Hand Steadiness

Skills You Need

- Speaking Talking to others to convey information effectively.
- Active Listening Giving full attention to what other people are saying, taking time to understand the points being made, ask questions as appropriate, and not interrupting at inappropriate times.
- Critical Thinking Using logic and reasoning to identify the strengths and weaknesses of alternative solutions, conclusions, or approaches to problems.
- Judgement and Decision Making –
 Considering the relative costs and
 benefits of potential actions to choose the
 most appropriate one.

- Treat dental problems or diseases.
- Record patient's medical histories.
- Examine mouth, teeth, gums, or related facial structures.
- Operate diagnostic or therapeutic medical instruments or equipment.
- Process x-rays or other medical images.
- Sterilize medical equipment or instruments.
- Maintain medical equipment or instruments.
- Provide health and wellness advice to patients, program participants, or caregivers.
- Administer anesthetics or sedatives to control pain.
- Direct healthcare delivery programs.
- Treat acute illnesses, infections, or injuries.
